#### **Grant Details**

Funds were sought to support the travel and expenses of Associate Professor Cassidy Sugimoto from Indiana University who also currently serves as the Program Director for the Science of Science and Innovation Policy program of the National Science Foundation. Thanks to the assistance of the Gender Institute, along with funds from the Joint Colleges of Science Equity and Diversity Committee, A. Prof Sugimoto was able to visit ANU to deliver a lunchtime talk followed by a panel discussion with high-profile discussants from industry and government.

#### **Event details**

- Talk title: "Gendered Labour Roles and Rewards in Science".
- Details: 27<sup>th</sup> August from 1 2:30pm in the Finkel Lecture Theatre
- Synopsis: This talk examined multiple layers of gender disparities in science, triangulating data from scientometrics, surveys, and social media to provide a broader perspective on the gendered nature of scientific communication. The extent of gender disparities and the ways in which new media are changing these patterns were discussed. The talk ended with a panel discussion of interventions and innovations that are disrupting the scholarly ecosystem.
- Feedback from attendees at the refreshments afterwards indicated that the talk was very well received, informed and informative.

#### **Impact**

The event was very well attended with 105 people registering. Recording of the audience on the day showed the event attracted ANU staff and students, representatives from CSIRO and federal government employees. The event attracted wider interest from a representative of UNSW Sydney who wanted "a video/transcript of this event...[to] get a broader understanding of gender parity in STEMM" which would assist with her work towards the UNSW Sydney Athena Swan program. CPAS staff are facilitating this access.

Directors from across the College of Science have asked for the slides from this event to discuss in their schools.

The Academy of Science has indicated that this research will inform their current policy scoping and Decadal plan for women in STEM.

Cassidy Sugimoto is pleased to collaborate further with colleagues at ANU as we improve our own data collection and research in this area.


